The Water Cycle – the recycling of water through evaporation, condensation, precipitation and collection

Erosion – the gradual wearing away of a surface by water

Deposition – the depositing of sediment when a river slows

Reflection – the throwing back of light without absorbing it

Shading – applying a colour mode densely to show darker areas

Cross-Hatching – using fine parallel lines close together to create the illusion of shade

In the world of theatre, some believe it is a cursed tale and only refer to it as "The Scottish Play".


The **Norfolk Broads** is a National Park with over 125 miles of navigable, lock-free waterways.
