Primary PGCE Child Studies and Understanding How Children Learn

What we will be doing

We have to study children to help us learn how to teach well. To do this, we will:

- Talk to children to find out about what they like doing at school and at home.
- Make notes of what children do during the school day.
- Find out what they need help with.
- See what they like to do at playtimes.

Teaching

We will also teach the children in line with the appropriate curriculum and the school's teaching and learning policies. We will study some children to see how they learn. When we are teaching, we will:

- Listen to how they talk and work together.
- Read to and with them.
- Talk to them about their work.
- Watch what they do and how they do it.
- Gather examples of work and of them engaging with learning.
- Talk to children about what they know and think.
- Encourage children to ask questions to help them find out more.
- Use our observations to help us think about how we can teach children better.
