Intergalactic Investigators

We have continued our investigation of the Solar System, learning about gravity and its affect on the Earth. We measured the weight and mass of different objects. Mass is measured in kilograms (kg) and weight is measured in Newtons (N).

Music inspired by 'The Planets' composed by Gustav Holst.

Between 1914 and 1917 the composer, Gustav Holst composed a suite of music called, 'The Planets'. Each piece was inspired by a different plane.
